EDUCATE • K-12 PROGRAMS





Results-Driven Programming - Designed to Inspire

A core strategy of the MCWT Foundation is to deliver programs that inspire girls from a young age to pursue technology. We do this by making technology education accessible and positively impacting girls and women from grade school to post-university life stages.

Programming includes summer technology camps, Girl Scouts collaborations, high school IT clubs, website design competitions, robotics programs, scholarships, internships, mentoring and networking. All of this is executed with a small staff and hundreds of skilled volunteers who believe in the Foundation's vision of making Michigan the No. 1 state for women in IT.

MCWT's network is united through a mission to inspire and grow girls and women in technology.



Girls GET IT Clubs

Working with school districts and educators, MCWT hosts weekly during- and after-school technology programs in a friendly environment. These Girls Exploring Together Information Technology (GET-IT) clubs provide hands-on learning activities in computer science, organize offsite field trips to partner companies, and encourage the girls to explore the possibilities of technology careers.

The program engages the girls throughout the school year in technology education, offering structured hands-on learning activities through a comprehensive technology-focused curriculum. Established in 2005, the program has supported 81 clubs involving 1,056 middle and high school students.

During the 2017-2018 school year, MCWT supported 18 clubs in which 231 girls participated.

GET IT Day

Hundreds of girls in grades 4 through 12 explore facets of computer science at GET IT Day. In 2018, MCWT partnered with Wayne State University and the WSU Society of Women Engineers to bring a group of 440 girls from 15 Detroit-area middle schools and high schools to spend a day immersing themselves in the world of IT.



"Hosting this event at a college was perfect; the girls walked away confident, excited about the possibilities and eager to learn more. It's an opportunity to show them how fun a technology career can be beyond what is covered in school textbooks. The girls worked with mini robots, experienced a roller coaster through virtual reality goggles, used Bluetooth to control a basketball, and learned about design thinking and digital footprints. 2,082 girls have participated since the program started in 2014.



Girls Solve IT - Powered by Ford

In 2018, MCWT partnered with Ford to launch an interactive, state-wide competition. Girls Solve IT, Powered by Ford is a competition for girls in grades 5-8 in Michigan. In 2018, teams were given three Michigan-inspired technology quests to complete in a given timeframe that qualified them for the state-wide competition, cash prizes and awards.

The top three teams were invited to attend the Scholarship Recognition and Girls Solve IT Awards in June at Silver Gardens Events Center in Southfield, where MCWT members and leaders from the Ford Girls Solve IT team congratulated the participants on their achievements.

Girls Solve IT impacted girls throughout Michigan in cities such as Kalamazoo, Detroit, Muskegon, and Saginaw.











Website Design Competition

MCWT provides an opportunity for one- or two-girl teams to showcase their web design skills and knowledge of HTML. During the three-monthlong competition complete with training sessions, girls demonstrate their web designs to industry experts. The 2018 theme was "My Week Without Technology" and finalists in the advanced group were invited to compete in an in-person judging event.

This annual competition is an excellent way for students to combine creative expression with technology while gaining HTML skills and confidence.

"I had the opportunity to learn coding and in the future I want to consider it as a profession. I was able to do two things I never thought I could: Go through a week without technology and make a website and upload it at the age of 12." - Maisha Hossain, Detroit International Academy for Young Women

162 COMPETITORS 73 TEAMS

MCWT hosted 162 competitors from 73 teams in 2018. This popular program has drawn 1,211 girls to compete since its inception in 2006.

"Designing our website was an amazing experience and our favorite part was being able to see our website's progress from what started off as a blank page to what you see here," said **Claire Yang during her** presentation. "We encountered several obstacles along the way, but overcoming these is what made this experience so much more rewarding. We've both always been really passionate about engineering and doing this competition only strengthened that interest."







Camp Infinity

Camp Infinity

Summer technology camps provide girls in grades 5 through 8 the opportunity to continue challenging themselves in computer science while school is out of session. MCWT Foundation provides weeklong camp experiences for girls entering grades 5 to 12. In 2018, this engaging program expanded into Mid-Michigan and Grand Rapids with the support of partner companies such as Ford, GM and Dow Chemical.

Camp participants design websites, use mobile apps to create video games and stories, and program robots. The program began in 2004 with one camp and in 2018, MCWT's 10 camps impacted 380 girls.

Since 2004, Camp Infinity has grown from one camp with 34 participants to 10 camps with 380 participants.





Scholarships

Retention of women in technology majors in college is below 10 percent; among MCWT scholarship recipients, that rate is over 90 percent.

MCWT knows the importance of higher-education when it comes to careers in technology, and through its scholarship program, is able to make a financial difference in the lives of women in IT.

MCWT awards these scholarships to women with the interest, aptitude and potential for a successful career in computer science.



Internships

The Early College Internship Program provides MCWT partner companies access to a talent pipeline and matches candidates with mutually beneficial placements.

Internship positions help to shape the career aspirations of the participants and are focused on undergraduate-level students who are enrolled full-time in courses for the upcoming school year at a Michigan college or university.

With a combination of thought leadership, networking, professional development and engaging formats, MCWT draws the best and brightest to industry-focused events throughout the year, including executive breakfast events, ConnectNet forums and socials, and the annual Executive Connection Summit.



Executive Breakfast

MCWT hosts two Executive Breakfast events each spring, where CIOs and technology leaders learn about our programs and initiatives, as well as enjoy powerful networking opportunities. Last year, 203 technology leaders attended the events held in Birmingham and Grand Rapids.



ConnectNet

ConnectNet forums and socials provide insight into exciting advances in technology and offer networking opportunities for IT professionals. We held 2018 ConnectNet events in Southeast Michigan and West Michigan focused on topics such as FinTech, emerging technologies, cyber security, and career development. Six ConnectNet events in 2018 drew 437 individuals.



Executive Connection Summit

More than 800 technology professionals met at the Detroit Marriott at the Renaissance Center for the sixth annual Executive Connection Summit hosted by MCWT and sponsored by FCA US LLC, Ford Motor Company and General Motors.

Business leaders discussed artificial intelligence and how it will affect IT careers, the way we do business, and how we work together. The summit also explored how leading from an innovation mindset can be a driver of organizational success.







Black and White Ball

Hosted by General Motors and sponsored by Fujitsu and TD Ameritrade, the event raised a record \$460,000 in gross revenue for programs that help inspire and grow girls and women in technology. MCWT held the black-tie affair at the Royal Park Hotel in Rochester, which featured an evening of networking, fundraising, casino games and celebration. More than 44 companies sponsored the event and over 550 professionals attended.

Golf Classic

The 2018 Golf Classic welcomed over 250 golfers who enjoyed the 36 holes of golf at Indianwood Golf and Country Club in Lake Orion. Over 30 sponsors supported the event, including 20 companies who are new to MCWT. The organization received help from over 35 volunteers who assisted in the planning and executing. The successful fundraiser resulted in \$188,000 raised to support MCWT's programming.

Mentoring

Women working in IT may face obstacles as they move through their careers. To help provide navigation on their journey, MCWT offers its members access to the Ignite! mentoring program, which is designed to help early- to mid-career professionals develop leadership skills and provide access to important networks of women in IT. Last year, 36 women participated. MCWT mentoring has enriched the lives of 258 women since its launch in 2007.



Woman of the Year in Technology

The Woman of the Year in Technology award is given to a woman in Michigan who is leading or driving change for women in information technology careers or fields of study. MCWT reviews the award nominations and identifies the woman who best personifies its mission of inspiring and growing women in IT.

MCWT presented its 2018 Woman of the Year in Technology award to Judy Asher. Asher is manager, Cyber Security Governance, Risk & Compliance and Security & Controls Compliance at Ford Motor Company. She has been engaged with MCWT for the past decade and is the chief mission officer for university programs. MCWT scholarships, technology camps and programs like Girls Solve IT have all gained momentum as a result of her dedication and mentoring.

MCWT Furthers Its Mission In West Michigan



Grand Rapids, Kalamazoo and Benton Harbor are among many cities in West Michigan that boast a diverse business community and strong technology presence. MCWT is proud to have members, volunteers and dedicated partners in this region who are supporting our mission and moving the ball forward for girls and women in technology.

In 2018, we grew our K-12 programming in West Michigan by adding Camp Infinity sessions in Holland and Grand Rapids and providing the Girls Rock IT program for local Girl Scouts. Several teams participated in the inaugural Girls Solve IT competition and the middle school team from Caledonia took home first place and the \$1,000 prize.

We also hosted professional networking events where West Michigan technology professionals provided insight into various aspects of their business, and met with business leaders at our executive breakfast.



The Ignite! mentoring program, MCWT's free career mentoring program designed to help early-to mid-career IT professionals develop leadership skills and network with other IT professionals, has a presence in this region and had 29 participants in the program in 2018.

The relationships we are building with IT leaders, professionals and corporate partners in West Michigan will help us make an even bigger impact in the years to come.


